### Welcome



I have the privilege to welcome you all to the Pathway Awards Ceremony to celebrate and draw closure to the 2023 season. Occasions such as these allow the girls and boys from across the pathway to unite as one in recognising the individual achievement and team successes of their peers, alongside the chance to reflect upon the season complete. I hope that you are able to recount special moments from the season and that you have all enjoyed the game we love to the fullest, either as a player competing in an Oxfordshire shirt or as supporting parent, family member, coach or spectator from the boundary. I thank all of the players, their families, our employees and the wider cricketing community for their contribution to the season of 2023.

Two key dates in the calendar for Oxfordshire Cricket this season were our showcase fixtures for the county men and women's teams at magnificent Wormsley Estate. The first of two took place on Sunday 30th July 2023, with our men's team contesting the annual National Counties Cricket Association showcase fixture against our partnered First Class County, Sussex Cricket. Just a few weeks later on Tuesday 15th August 2023, our women's team would contest the Women's showcase fixture against the Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC), with the match itself part of the broader Women and Girls showcase event. The effectiveness of our partnership with Sussex Cricket would also provide a showcase event for the Boys Under 12, Under 13 and Under 14 age groups, who had the rare opportunity to play against Sussex at The 1st Central County Ground, Hove on Monday 7th August 2023. Each team contested a T20 fixture at the first class ground in what was a memorable and enjoyable experience for all. I shall allow this booklet to fulfil its role in capturing a story of the season from each of our pathway age groups and I hope that you have a chance to digest the series of reports at your leisure.

Producing repeated and long-term performance achievement is a sought outcome of the talent development system and in 2023, we would again congratulate individuals for their performance achievements and teams for their success on the field. Achievements on the pitch were not exclusive to a single area or stage of development, but a special mention must go out to the Girls Under 13 for their team success in winning the King's College Festival in Taunton. The talent development system seeks to sustain a talent pipeline that populates recreational and professional cricket within one of our priorities to produce Academy and Professional players. We give kudos to Dylan Driscoll and Abi Norgrove who retained on the Sussex Cricket and Southern Vipers Academy respectively, with Abi progressing to make her first team debut for the Southern Vipers within the Rachael Heyhoe Flint Trophy. We also celebrate the achievement of Chloe Westbury, Katie Waugh and Amiee Diab also earned selection on the inaugural Southern Vipers Emerging Players programme and Arhur Hanson's who was selected to represent the South & West at ECB David English Bunbury Festival.

### Welcome

Via the ECB dual registration system Julian Laird, Luke Hayes, Jacob Townsend, Alfie Smethurst, Henry Welch, Tristan Rossouw, Arthur Hanson and Adrian Hector were all able to represent Sussex Cricket within County Age Group Cricket to further their progression and to support their aspiration in attaining selection onto the Sussex Cricket Academy for 2024. We will continue to work collaboratively with our first-class partners Sussex Cricket, and the Southern Vipers in order to provide a clear transition route into academy or professional cricket programmes for players from Oxfordshire.

The season of 2023 would give evidence of our ability to transition players in the county Women and Men's teams, with a host of current boys and girls making their full debuts during the year, or in continuing to retain a place within the teams earned in prior years throughout the season. For some their trajectory within the game extends beyond our women and men's teams and we give particular mention to a select number of pathway graduates for their excellence with the deliberate intention that it helps to inspire our current pathway players that it could one day be them achieving such success. Tom Price became the first cricketer to score a century and take a hat-trick on the same day and the 17th person in history to achieve this feat in a first-class game. Younger brother, Oliver Price would not be outdone, earning the PCA Player of the Month Award for August 2023 for his Metro bank 50 over performances, including 2 x 100s and 3 x 50s. Both brothers would also become prominent members of the Gloucestershire team in 2023. Zach Lion-Cachet became the first player from Oxfordshire to score a century in all three National Counties Cricket Association Men's competition formats, in total amassing four hundreds within a single season and propelling himself into the Sussex Cricket team for his List A debut against Worcestershire in August 2023. James Coles would perform well for the England Under 19s during the winter months and establish himself as first team regular at Sussex Cricket during the 2023 season. Luke Charlesworth would be the next in a long list of Oxfordshire players to make the progression into first class cricket making his debut for Gloucestershire at the back end of the season. Within the women's game, Fi Morris would become the first bowler in the Women's Hundred to record a five-wicket haul, conceding just seven runs in the process on her debut for Manchester Originals against the Birmingham Phoenix on the 7th Aug 2023.

Ensuring that the pathway continues to be accessible, inclusive and as affordable as possible is a priority for Oxfordshire Cricket and we remain committed to removing financial barriers for talent inclusion. We demonstrated the commitment to reduce the overall cost of pathway participation by offering a full reimbursement of the Phase 1 participation costs and partial reimbursement of the Phase 2 participation costs incurred to each participant during the 2022-23 programme cycle. The reimbursement process gave the option to donate the amount to either our Hardship Fund or State School Funds, which allow us to aid families where participation in the pathway may have otherwise been unaffordable via our player bursaries and to help bridge the opportunity gap between independent and state sectors by delivering programmes for state school players. We express our sincere gratitude to anyone who made a donation to either of the funds via the reimbursement process or via other methods throughout the year - your support has an impact and is highly appreciated. Alongside the financial support of phase 1 and 2, we also extended a number of interventions to tackle both affordability and accessibility. These included the increased awareness of our player bursaries online and within phase communication, the provision of free of charge Falcons and Bulls programmes for state school players and the continuation of free attendance to the pathway awards ceremony. Further, we would again subsidise all touring experiences where the actual cost exceeded £400, setting £400 as the maximum cost per player and providing the option to pay the full amount should an individual have wished to donate the difference to the hardship fund.

As we look ahead to 2024 and beyond, we are acutely aware of the impact that the Independent Commission for Equity in Cricket (ICEC) report will have on the future of the game. Whilst we await the ECB's response to the ICEC report, we have continued to fully digest the publication to better understand its findings, recommendations, the experiences that people have had and its impact. Our position remains that there is no place for discrimination in our game and the wider society, and we are fully committed to making cricket a game for everyone and the sport of choice in Oxfordshire. We hope that you enjoy the Pathway Awards Ceremony and that it will inspire everyone to achieve more success within the game during 2024.

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### **Pathway Overview**



Thank you for coming to join us at Wormsley for the 2023 Performance Awards ceremony, where we will celebrate the successes of the year.

For a player participating in a pathway, success can take many forms. Success can be obvious; 50s, 100s, 5fers, 4fers, winning the game for your team. Success may be individualised; your highest score, best bowling figures or taking a great catch. But more often than not, successes are hidden and hard to quantify as part of a long-term developmental journey. Today, we come together to recognise the individual and team successes from the 2023 season, but equally as important are the hidden successes we've shared throughout the year, both on and off the field, which provide the building blocks for years to come.

In October 2022, we welcomed 394 newly nominated players from the Under 10 to Under 18 age groups to Phase 1, held at venues across Oxfordshire. Players were then invited to join our previous years returning cohort for Phase 2, which started in November, where 749 players participated in a 6 week programme across 8 venues on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. At the same time, we were delighted to be able to grow the offering of our Bulls & Falcons programmes, which provides targeted support for players within our pathway, who attend state schools, with the introduction of training support pre-Christmas for the first time. As we entered 2023, Phase 3 commenced for players who had been selected to progress. It was fantastic to be able to support 590 players for a 10 week indoor programme, followed by an outdoor phase which allows us to transfer our learnings to the game, as well as confirm our talent selection decisions in a game based environment.

Phase 4 then began at various stages from late April to June, with those age groups participating in ECB Competitions taking the new ball. In spite of some challenging weather, we were fortunate to be able to run 130 Phase 4 fixtures, plus 6 tours and a handful of Bulls & Falcons fixtures. Although winning is not part of our approach to long-term talent development, it's fantastic to see the hard work of all those involved with our pathway programme rewarded with successful results across our age groups, in particular the Girls Under 13s who won their festival at King's College, Taunton.

As the 2022/23 season draws to a close, it's important to take a moment to capture the moments from this year which challenged us, and offered opportunities to grow. Over the coming months the 2023/24 season will begin and time can be dedicated to working on our development areas, and honing our super-strengths. At this point we also say goodbye and thank you to the players who have come to the end of their Under 18s activity - best of luck for your future and we hope to see you again.

Lastly, I would like to extend a huge thank you to all of you who were involved in our Pathway Programme for the 2022/23 year. Cricket is a sport which requires a huge amount of unpaid support; ground preparation, officiating, scoring, not to mention the mileage count on your cars - thank you and we look forward to welcoming you back again next year.

Twelve months ago I wrote about a halcyon, endless summer, with matches only punctuated by water breaks and the lightest of glances speeding across sun-starched outfields. Twelve months onwards, it has taken until September to record the hottest day of the summer, but the Under-10s have still enjoyed a season that has proven remarkably free of interruptions, and ultimately filled end-to-end with thrilling cricket.

The internal matches between the Panthers and Lynx squads have been hard-fought and closely-matched, whether playing T20 or having their first experience of the longer formats, including Win/Lose/Draw and declaration games. One stand-out quality throughout the season has been the boys' ability to apply themselves at the crease and bat for long periods of time, rising to the challenge of playing red-ball "test match" style cricket, building partnerships and innings with them.

Our squad of 30 boys rotated roles and selections through the inter-county fixtures, holding their own against competitive opposition, fighting hard against Gloucestershire and recording comprehensive victories over Northamptonshire and Worcestershire. Having proven far too strong for Dorset's "Shadow" squad, we finished the summer with a memorable victory over Wiltshire with an ice-cool run chase on a red-hot day, turning 29/5 into 104/7 with overs to spare. Individually, Mustafa Shah, Matthew Bollinghaus, James Acton and Charlie Lamb made contrasting fifties, with Matthew's accumulation against Northants and Charlie's blitzkrieg at Cothill occupying opposite ends of the batting spectrum.

With the ball, Acton's pace proved a constant threat, never more so than when taking 4/3 against Worcester, whilst Louis Harris-Bass provided a similar challenge with his left-arm angle. Freddie Fowler (6/15) and "super-sub" Kingsley McGeown (5/14) also returned memorable figures. There was little respite with pace off the ball, either, as our phalanx of spinners regularly created havoc. This was never more apparent than in the final internal game of the season, when Lamb's 5/15 set the standard, only for Harry Rowland-Clark to raise the bar even further, with figures of 6/10 including a hat-trick. With Anvay Chandrawale and Arthur Floyd proving a pair of off-spinners with angelic faces and devilish quicker balls, and Will Bedford providing the contrast of left-arm wrist-spin, trial by spin was a regular theme of the summer.

Our trip to the Minor Counties Festival at the Royal Hospital School proved a challenging week, taking on Under-11 opposition and bowling and fielding superbly throughout the week. The extra pace of the opposition bowling attacks made run-scoring a tough task, but Sonny McGeown in particular showed the value of a secure technique, a vertical bat and a mind full of concentration.

After defeats to Cleveland and East Wales, McGeown and Freddie Fowler came close to securing a valiant draw against the Netherlands from a position that had looked impossible. Their efforts inspired a whole-team effort against West Essex the following day, putting us in an exceptional position before the weather's most significant intervention of the summer robbed us of the chance to close out the victory.

The tour ended against Invicta Kent, where Jack Wale's four-wicket haul and Arthur Stewart's candidate for catch of the season - alongside a typical flurry of direct-hit run outs - capped another fine bowling display, before the week's exertions took their toll on our batting efforts.

Behind the stumps, all of the wicketkeepers saw the rewards of their hard work throughout the winter, growing in confidence in their glovework and footwork. I'm still not sure that Northamptonshire believed us when we told them that Henry Bowers hadn't kept before this season.

The squad have worked together tremendously well throughout the summer, living up to our values of having fun and still learning something along the way. Come the end of the summer, the levels of independence and initiative that the boys have demonstrated on match days have been superb: a testament to the application they have shown throughout the year. They have been a pleasure to coach, and I look forward to following their achievements in the years to come. Unless I have to face James on a Saturday...

The progress this group of girls has made since we all got together back in October last year has been quite amazing and has only been surpassed by the amount of fun we have all had. The girls worked really hard in the winter on their batting and bowling skills but also incredibly hard on their fielding skill and this combination of skill sets has proven to be massively beneficial as the season progressed.

We started with 2 x T20's against Berkshire, winning one game each as the girls started to bond together as a team. Another 2 x T20's against Gloucestershire at Charlbury saw the girls win both with Bebe Buckley-Sharp scoring 31 and Rosie Morgan taking 2 wickets for 4 runs in the first match and Rosie top scoring with 22 in the second. We next entertained Buckinghamshire at Greys Green and again ran out victors in both matches with Flora Alexander and Ruby Wilkie taking 2 wickets each and Ruby top scoring with 29 in the first match, Freya Monk scoring 21 and Abby Kirkman taking 2 wickets in the second match. Our away fixture with Gloucestershire was rained off so we next travelled to Oundle School to play Northamptonshire where we won one game each. The first was a real nail-biter which we won with 2 balls to spare and only 1 wicket left. Annabel Foster keeping her cool to hit the winning runs in a game which saw 7 different girls take wickets all clean bowled and Esme Bell with a great keeping catch for the other. The highlight of the second match was an unbeaten 49 from Poppy Wilson. Our home match against Wiltshire fell foul of the weather but a few days later in glorious sunshine we went on tour to Rugby School. 5 games in 3 days with victories against Warwickshire, Northamptonshire and Staffordshire but what stood out, apart from a stunning one-handed catch from Bebe against Northamptonshire, was the amazing teamwork and camaraderie that

developed over the 3 days. The weather was again not our friend with the match against Buckinghamshire called off due to torrential rain and so we finished off the season back at Greys Green with a match against Berkshire which the visitors won by 3 wickets, highlight of the match was Seren Quinn smashing four 6's over Cow Corner on her way to 47 not out.

We won an incredible 9 matches this season, which is a fantastic achievement, the manner of the victories however has been the most pleasing thing from a coaching point of view. The teamwork, girls supporting and encouraging each other, remembering to back up, walk in and all the numerous other skills in the field has been a joy to watch. The bowling this year has been on another level with so many girls standing up at different times and making significant contributions, the tour match against Staffordshire is one of my proudest moments, when the girls defended a score of 72 with the best display of controlled bowling and fielding I have seen in any of my seasons as the Under 11's coach. The batting has developed with the girls learning new shots, when to defend, when to attack, finding gaps in the field, and importantly to recognise match situations and how to close the game out with a victory, demonstrated with our win away to Northamptonshire, which in previous seasons we would probably have lost. This season has given us many special moments and the girls have grown and developed so much both as young people and as cricketers, it has been an absolute pleasure to coach them.

The Boys Under 11 age group began their season with a trip over to Stowe School to play Northamptonshire. Despite being 68-8 Northants managed to score 170 which was easily defended by 94 runs. Oxfordshire's spinners did most of the initial damage with Emmanuel Syddall being the pick of the bowlers with 3-26. This was followed by a 40 over fixture Vs Wiltshire where Jack Townsend, Kaian Eaton, David Powell-Jones and Lewis Yeung all contributed to a decent score of 186-7. This was defended in fine fashion as Jack Townsend led the charge with 4 wickets to bowl Wiltshire out for 81. After this the boys travelled down to Middlesex, where a drubbing was endured. A shout out to Will Logan for carrying his bat throughout the chaos. The rain won Vs Gloucestershire and a very close match Vs Berkshire went Berkshire's way by 8 runs. Thomas Kent lead the bowling unit with 3-11 and Jacob Kandola battled with the bat as an opener.

After this, 15 of the boys descended on Taunton for 5 days of 40 over cricket. They performed well, winning 4 out of 5 matches and losing the other one by 1 run. They fell foul of the bonus points system to come away having achieved second place. Highlights included Harry Sedgwick picking up 5-11 Vs Invicta Kent, a fluid 75 from Max Smith Vs Northants, Xander Smith completing a hattrick Vs Washington and Elis Healey hitting a battling 51 Vs Somerset. The most pleasing thing from a coaching perspective was how hard all the boys worked in the field and how they helped each other through difficult periods off of the field.

The season's penultimate fixtures were 2 X T20's Vs Middlesex at Didcot. With the previous outing Vs Middlesex it was brilliant to see how much of a fight the boys put up. Despite losing both contests they were in both games including 46 from Kaian Eaton, 38 from Harry Sedgwick and 2-5 from Siddhant Nirmal. The season concluded with 2 X T20's Vs Berkshire where the boys struggled and came up short twice. Will Foster and Elis Healey both made decent scores.

Overall a fantastic year and a thank you to all parents and guardians for their help and support throughout the year.

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
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The season started at Stowe with the first external match against Northamptonshire. Batting first in challenging conditions, the innings got off to a steady start before a hatrick by leg spinner White set us back. Captain Galbraith battled hard in a captain's innings as he made 45, with Dineen and Ekelund both contributing with 19 to help set the hosts 130 to win. In response, and with the need to bowl the hosts out, we started to see some of the attacking field sets and plans that we saw take place indoors, and in the first few internal games come to fruition. There was a real buzz of energy and intensity, as opportunities began to come, and wickets started to fall. Northants in response began to counter, as they went on to win by 5 wickets.

Next up was a closely fought internal fixture at Exeter College, where the learnings from the first match were being developed in a good game which saw the Invicibles score 169-8 and the Lightning in response 121ao. This was followed by a defeat against a strong Buckinghamshire side in a rain affected close game that saw the team fall 63 runs short in the chase, the game saw a fantastic bowling display by the team to restrict Bucks to 159. Unfortunately the weather then saw the Gloucestershire away match at Lydney called off.

The MCCF Suffolk Festival tour soon followed in what turned out to be a memorable week. Day 1 saw us play Cleveland. Losing the toss and being put in to bat first, the boys started positively as we went on to 229-8 before declaring with Spicer (32), Bisson (28), Tappin (32), Humphreys (23), Galbraith (32) and Amies (26) all getting starts. With the weather shifting to being overcast with some slight drizzle around, the boys got off to a great start as they looked to take wickets with Raymond (2), Galbraith (3) and Oseman (2) sharing the wickets to guide us to a 144 run win. Day 2 saw a very close battle on Lords against Netherlands. Having won the toss and elected to bat, we lost early wickets and were 35-6. Needing to consume pressure and bat our overs - Green (62\*), Bisson (20\*) and Floyd (17) helped guide us to a respectable 139-7 off our 45 overs showing a great sense of resilience and determination under great pressure. In response Netherlands lost early wickets. Rowan-Hull (3), Tappin (2), Humphreys (2), Galbraith (2) and Bisson (1) all contributed with the ball to help guide us to a great and memorable win by 29 runs in the 42nd over, which saw the game shift back and forward with Netherlands going for the win and draw at different points. The team held their nerve, showing some great patience and creativity to create opportunities and take wickets. A superb diving catch by Theo late on off his bowling to get a crucial wicket, before Cosmo got the last wicket. Every season within a Player Pathway brings with it challenge, enjoyment and plenty of learning opportunities- this year was no exception, and hopefully a memorable part of everyone's journey.

Throughout the winter over 100 Under 13 Boys were able to access training opportunities at various time points. This allows us, as a Pathway, the chance to have a significant impact on cricket both in the short and long term, creating a strength in depth within the County. Following on from competitive Internal Festival Days held at Didcot Cricket Club, which saw 72 players competing against each other in fixtures which demonstrated the depth of skill within the age group, a final squad of 30 was selected to compete against teams representing other Counties at this age group.

Match-play, from June - September, offers players the opportunity to play cricket which represents, as closely as we can, the formats played in the professional game; 20 over "white ball" and 40 over "red ball". A blend of internal and external fixtures not only provide as many playing opportunities as possible to players within the squad, but also the ability to control the way the game looks to help players navigate what the game of the future may look like. Providing players with a variety of playing roles within multiple situations forms a strong foundation and understanding of the game and its nuances. At 13 years old, it's easy to overlook the game of the future, and your role within it, but as coaches we need to have a long-term perspective.

Although 'Summer' only lasted one week, we were still able to hold 10 match days within Phase 4, the majority of which took place toward the end of the Summer during August. The season was littered with memorable individual performances, Oliver Beard with 75\* in the opening game against Northamptonshire, Nico Hartley taking 5 for 23 against Gloucestershire and Sam Allen with 58\* against Worcestershire to name a few. Within our Internal competition, the Eagles and the Buzzards finished tied on two wins each, with the Buzzards dominating within the longer format fixtures but the Eagles holding on for Draws in both games. Nico Hartley with 74\* and Ben Wickens with a run a ball 61 in the first game, followed by 88 for Harry Bewes in the second long format game. Sadly, our run finished there against a side who fielded several Academy players, being dismissed for just 96 chasing Hampshire's 280-7. But rain intervened, washing out much of day two and part of day three, with Oxfordshire just two runs short of victory in a truncated second innings. A total wash-out on day two in Devon rendered it impossible to force a result, although there was a first-ever five wicket haul for Matt Ford, with Henry Welch also taking five. The match in Berkshire also saw a full-day wash-out, on day one, but again, Oxfordshire had the best moments of the match, Tristan scoring a magnificent and near chanceless 158 in their first innings. But, with a day washed out, once again, only a draw was possible.

Sadly, the final match of the season summed up the weather, as once again there was more than a day's play washed out, meaning for the first time ever, each game ended in draw, meaning Oxfordshire could only finish in mid-table. The under 18 season marks the end of the pathway for a number of players, but they have been a talented bunch who have represented Oxfordshire Cricket well, both on and off the field of play. Darryl and I would like to thank all for their commitment to Oxfordshire Cricket, and pass on those thanks to all the parents who have supported the team, and us, so well over the last two to three years.Good luck to you all, wherever your cricketing journey heads towards.

Statistics show that Disability Cricket along with Women & Girls Cricket are the fastest growing areas of our great game and Oxfordshire Disability Cricket is certainly playing it's part in that growth. The 'new and improved' partnership between The Lords Taverners and The ECB has meant that more main stream schools and colleges, with SEND groups, will now have softball and table cricket sessions delivered regularly as part of their curriculum. This growth requirement has enabled Oxfordshire Cricket to employ an additional Community Cricket Coach whose main role will be to deliver fun sessions to the new SEND locations as well as supporting the existing disability programme. Exciting times but hard work ahead if we are to meet the KPI's of our programme funders. 2023 has, once again, shown how popular our Lords Taverners Super 1 groups are with the four Hubs running in Oxford, Bicester, Abingdon and Witney continuing to thrive throughout the year. Thanks go to Horspath, Abingdon Vale and Bicester & North Oxford Cricket Clubs for allowing us to use their excellent facilities throughout the summer and Abingdon & Witney College, The Park Sports Centre Wheatley, Bicester Leisure Centre and ICE Witney for making us so welcome during the winter period.

We took part in three Disability Festival, this year, with our friends from Gloucestershire and Hertfordshire. Each one of us hosting a round robin tournament and again many thanks to Abingdon Vale Cricket Club for hosting the Oxfordshire Festival. These events enable us all to mix and renew or begin friendships with parents, carers, coaches and the wider disability families in the three counties. It is so important for us all to gain support and strength from these get togethers and to show that we are not alone and can rely on our friends to help us through the difficult times that we all have. We also have a number of Inter Hub social get togethers, throughout the year, and we are so fortunate to have the support of one of our parents who turns her back 'lawn' into a decent wicket for these events. The refreshments are also fantastic and again allow us all to recharge our batteries by chatting to other families and carers. Many thanks to this so supportive family. You know who you are!

The Hubs are a very important but the schools and college delivery is a major part of the programme. Softball and Table Cricket sessions were delivered to eight Special Schools and College Pathway Groups, during the year. This enabled four hundred unique participants with learning and or physical disabilities to enjoy these fun sessions and take part in the National Lords Taverners Table Cricket Tournament culminating in the National Final at Lords, the home of cricket. For the second year running Abingdon & Witney College (Abingdon) won the Oxfordshire and London & Home Counties titles and took part in the Lords Final in June. A fantastic achievement.

The Lords Taverners have also begun a national programme of supplying Table Cricket Kits to Special Schools and Colleges. These are a new design and are enabling the recipients to practice this superb game throughout the year. We currently have six kits in locations throughout the county. Beware Abingdon competition could be coming your way! As already mentioned the SEND programme in Main Stream Schools will be expanded during the rest of 2023 and moving into 2024. We will also be identifying and training Young Volunteers who will assist in the organising and running of Softball and Table Cricket sessions and competitions.

Running alongside the Oxfordshire Disability Cricket Programme is the ECB Disability Cricket Champion Club initiative. This is a programme for clubs who wish to run their own Disability Section and is supported by Oxfordshire Cricket and The ECB. We currently have two clubs Minster Lovell and Oxford taking part in this great initiative and another club beginning the application process. Please contact me if your club is interested in becoming an ECB DCCC. Full support and training is available for coaches and volunteers on an ongoing basis if required. A busy year ahead but we can all be safe in the knowledge that children and young adults in Oxfordshire, with any kind of disability, have access to cricket sessions that are fun and will help them achieve their full potential going forward in life.
